From a young age, Nicholas was recognised for his musical talents. He was invited to rehearse and perform with the Senior Concert Band from Year 8 and has since remained an integral member of the ensemble.

Nicholas was recognised for his leadership in Music by his election as Year 12 Leader of Vocal Ensembles. This is a role he has taken seriously and displayed his leadership through actions. He has been proactive in the recruitment of younger students into the Vocal Ensembles, taken an active role in rehearsals in offering guidance to his fellow choristers and has always been prepared to embrace the challenge of singing lead or solo parts when required.

For the past four years, Nicholas has successfully auditioned for, and participated in, Gondwana Voices – a national choral experience held in Sydney each January, for the best young voices in Australia. Through these experiences, he has developed an extensive knowledge of repertoire, particularly of Australian choral music, and has willingly shared his experience with his peers and staff.

Nicholas' attendance rate at rehearsals has been flawless as has his commitment to ensuring that the ensembles to which he belongs perform at the highest possible standard.

Ethan Cassidy – Honours for Pipe Band Service

Ethan joined the Pipe Band in 2013 and was playing at public performances within eighteen months, which is well within the normal expectation. He became a member of the 'A Team' in 2016 and has, therefore, completed two years in this team. Again, the usual expectation is at least one year in the A Team.

To date, Ethan has participated in 104 Pipe Band engagements, including 12 as a soloist; this is an incredible effort and one of the two highest in the history of the Pipe Band. He has performed as a soloist for VIP functions on several occasions and performed all solos and duets within the Band including high profile and vice regal functions such as Andre Rieu in concert, US Memorial Day and the Mathias Cormann Fundraising Dinner. Ethan has achieved a 100 per cent attendance rate, an exceptional effort given a practice and rehearsal regime of four to five times each week spanning a timeframe of four years.

Ethan's piping is of a very high standard and he would be graded Intermediate in the Australian Pipe Band College. He is performing pieces of advanced time signatures, which far exceeds what is expected of a member of a school Pipe Band. This is a precursor for a Grade 2 Pipe Band or above. An example of this was an invitation extended by WAPOL for Ethan to guest with them. Ethan possesses all the drive and determination required to succeed at an elite level.

In recognition of his ability Ethan was appointed Pipe Lance Corporal in 2016 and Pipe Major in 2017. He has a fantastic attitude and has provided strong leadership in the Pipe Band. Ethan is an excellent role model, has powerful organisational skills, completes all tasks independently and always leads by example. Ethan is often sought to provide input into the assessment of junior members' competence and ability prior to performances and marching.

Ethan is responsible for the flag orderlies and rehearsals and there is no better example of a student taking initiative and mentoring boys within the College's framework of culture and tradition. Similarly, he has created his own legacy by delivering a Pipe Major's exit speech at the 2017 Year 12 Formal Dining Out evening, an event run wholly by the boys, which is certain to be embraced by future Pipe Majors.

Ethan was successful in auditioning for both the Royal Edinburgh Military Tattoo in 2015 and the Royal Nova Scotia International Tattoo in 2017 and, as such, has performed on the world stage twice, an outstanding achievement for a student.

Prior to Nova Scotia, Ethan recorded audio of all the Tattoo music for the boys to utilise during their preparations. Whilst abroad, Ethan liaised with event management, organised and structured rehearsals and created playing rosters for the playing group. He has been an excellent ambassador for the College and, at all times, demonstrated faultless conduct.

Ethan was successful in winning the State Pipe Band Championships in the Juvenile division, 2015/2017, the Fremantle Championships in Grade 4, 2016 and leading the Pipe Band to victory in the Grade 4 State Pipe Band Championships in 2017. Ethan has also experienced success at solo level, placing second in both C and B Grades at the Fremantle Championships.

In addition to his usual band responsibilities, Ethan attended Year 9 practices. He was not required to do this but did so to provide direction and assistance to the younger members of the Band. He has also tutored before and after school and during recess and lunch on a regular basis for two years.

Ethan's contribution to the Pipe Band is well over and above expectation of a Pipe Major. He has an excellent attitude, is an exemplary role model and a highly deserving recipient of Honours.

Nathan Schaff – Honours for Pipe Band Service

Nathan Schaff joined the Pipe Band in 2014 and was playing at public performances within sixteen months, which is well within the expectation of approximately 18 months.

Nathan became a member of the A Team in 2016 and has therefore completed two years in this team. Again, members aim to complete at least one year in the A Team.

To date, Nathan has participated in 71 Pipe Band engagements, including nine as a soloist; a considerable effort by any standard. He has performed as a soloist on numerous occasions and performed various solos and duets within the Pipe Band. Nathan has achieved an outstanding attendance rate of 100 per cent.

Nathan's piping is of a very high standard. He would be graded Intermediate in the Australian Pipe Band College. He is performing pieces of advanced time signatures, which far exceeds the expectation of a member of a school Pipe Band.

Nathan has assisted in the construction of various harmonies for the Pipe Band repertoire and competition medleys and has written his own compositions including most recently a complex arrangement of a 12/8 jig into a Pipe Band suite. This has involved an array of numerous piping parts along with Concert Band instruments creating a full ensemble effect; a significant effort for a juvenile piper.

Nathan has experienced outstanding success as member of the Competition Band, winning the PLC 100 Competition in 2015, the State Pipe Band Championships in 2015, 2016 and 2017, the Fremantle Championship in 2016 in the Juvenile Division, the State Pipe Band Championships Grade 4 in 2017 and the Fremantle Championships in Grade 4 in 2016 and 2017.

Nathan was successful in auditioning for the Royal Nova Scotia International Tattoo in 2017 and his conduct throughout was impeccable.

In addition to his usual band responsibilities, Nathan attended Year 9 practices. He was not required to do this but did so to provide direction and assistance to the younger members of the Band for a period in excess of two years, which is incredible commitment.

Nathan's achievements in the Pipe Band have been over and above what is required (or expected) of a Pipe Major and he is a well deserving recipient of Honours for his service to the Pipe Band.

Christopher Watts – Honours for Pipe Band Achievement

Chris Watts joined the Pipe Band in 2013 and was playing at public performances within fifteen months, well within the normal expectation of approximately 18 months.

Chris became a member of the A Team in 2015 and has, therefore, completed three years in the team. Again, the aim is for members to complete at least one year in the A Team so three years is an exceptional effort.

To date, Chris has participated in 112 Pipe Band engagements, including 10 as a soloist; this is a massive effort by any standard and is, to date, the highest number of performances by an individual member of the Pipe Band. He has performed as a soloist on numerous occasions and has performed various solos and duets within the Band. Solo performances such as a 24-hour, round trip to Albany to pipe in the Borders as they completed their Bibbulmun Track walk, numerous ANZAC Day dawn services, high profile and vice regal functions. Chris has maintained a 100 per cent attendance which is exceptional when one considers a practice and rehearsal regime of four to five times per week spanning four years.

Chris' piping is of a very high standard. He would be graded Intermediate in the Australian Pipe Band College. Chris is performing pieces of advanced time signatures, which far exceeds the expectation of a member of a school Pipe Band. This is a precursor for a Grade 2 Pipe Band or above. A recent example of this was Chris being shortlisted for the St Andrews College Piping Scholarship (University of Sydney), flying to Sydney to audition in front of an assessment panel at the College. Chris has all the drive and determination required to succeed at an elite level.

In recognition of his ability Chris was appointed Pipe Lance Corporal in 2016 and Pipe Sergeant in 2017. He has a fantastic attitude and has provided strong leadership within the Pipe Band. Chris' input is often sought in the assessment of junior members' competence and ability prior to performances and marching.

This is an outstanding result for a student and Chris has been an admirable ambassador for the College.
